Nineteen Marshfield High School seniors, with three chaperones, returned at the end of March after traveling abroad to see new sights, but more importantly, to meet new people.

It was just what Molly and Dr. David Singer had envisioned when they proposed their idea to then-Marshfield High principal Peter Deftos last year. They wanted the trip to be a memorial for their son, Brooks. (Brooks would have graduated with this year's senior class).

David Singer and his son often went on adventures to wild and ex-

otic places.

Marshfield High School wanted to honor Brooks' passing in some manner. David Singer said Deftos had nice ideas for memorials and statues. However, his wife knew that for Brooks, there needed to be something more living and perpetual. That's when Molly came up with the idea of Brooks World Travel.

Once the concept was accepted, they had to figure out a destination. According to social studies teacher and trip leader Dom Centorino, a compromise had to be reached.

"It's sort of a funny story," Centorino said. "Dr. Singer's first suggestion was Indonesia," he said. Deftos had in mind something a little closer to home and with less of a culture shock – say Tennessee.

"We felt comfortable doing that," Centorino said.

Martin urges incoming seniors to apply for the trip. "Get in-


volved," she said. "It was the opportunity of a lifetime."

Centorino said.

Friendships spread beyond the group. The travelers bonded with their tour guide, Jodie. One of their favorite destinations was visiting Villiers High School in London. Nicole MacKinnon said she felt the friendships made while visiting this high school were in honor of Brooks Singer.

The group met with several of the classes and answered basic questions, like whether they wore uniforms to school.

"In the classroom they asked us a lot of questions," Labo said. He said they didn't see a big difference between them.

The Marshfield travelers enjoyed their new friends so much that they went back for a second day to meet informally, hang and play a little football (American soccer).

Labo was hoping to catch a

meeting held between him, Mc-Gourty and Marshfield High School principal Bob Keuther.

There will be a few changes to the program, including the timing of the trip. It will take place during April vacation rather than during school hours.

Also, there will be modifications to the fundraising. Centorino explained that the students would have more ownership for their share of the trip, but that a scholarship fund would be established. There will be fundraising events, he said, but the fundraising just may not be so elaborate.

The group will have to put off meeting until the teacher contract negotiations are settled. The teachers are engaged in a work-to-rule move, which means they won't participate in activities not spelled out in their contract. Many extra-curricular activities are volunteer.
